A retired IAS officer from Diphu, Karbi Anglong, Assam, Shri Longki Phangcho is renowned as a distinguished social worker and farmer. Throughout his career, he has demonstrated an unwavering commitment to public service and community development.

Presently, he serves as an advisor to the Purbottar Janajatiya Siksha Samiti under the guidance of Vidya Bharati, Akhil Bharatiya Shiksha Sansthan, and Purbottar Janajatiya Siksha Samiti. He is also associated with Akhil Bharatiya Vanavasi Kalyan Ashram.

During his illustrious career, he has held pivotal roles including Deputy Commissioner in Karimganj,

Lakhimpur, and Karbi Anglong Districts in Assam. He has served as Director of the Tribal Research Institute for SC and ST, Assam, and Director of Welfare of Plain Tribes and Backward Classes, Assam. Additionally, he has been Commissioner of Excise, Assam, Commissioner and Secretary of Welfare of Plain Tribes and Backward Classes, Assam, and the Mines and Mineral Department. He has also served as Principal Secretary of the Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council, Diphu, and Secretary to the Government of Assam in the Labour and Employment Department.

Shri Longki Phangcho has been instrumental in drafting Bills related to the Constitutional Protections of Backward Communities, Preservation and Protection of Traditional Customary Laws, Language and Literature of Ethnic Tribes of the North East India Region, and has conducted National Seminars on the preparation of Vision Documents for Scheduled Tribes of the North East India Region.

He has undertaken official tours to England, France, Switzerland, Holland, Thailand, and Singapore.

Shri Tenzing Norbu Thongdok, the incumbent Member of the North Eastern Council (NEC), hails from Itanagar, Arunachal Pradesh, and boasts a distinguished career in both civil engineering and politics. Graduating from Jorhat Engineering College, Assam, in 1973 with a degree in Civil Engineering, he is also an alumnus of Rashtriya Military School, Bangalore, and was honored with the Fellowship of The Institute of Engineering India (FIE) for his significant contributions to the engineering field.

Over the span of his illustrious career, Shri Thongdok has served in various capacities within the Government of Arunachal Pradesh. Notably, he held positions such as Chief Engineer - PWD and Chief Engineer - Power from April 1989 to April 2004, eventually retiring as Secretary to the Government of Arunachal Pradesh in February 2009.


Transitioning into politics post-retirement, Shri Thongdok was elected to the Arunachal State Assembly in 2009, representing the Kalaktang Assembly Constituency. Throughout his tenure, he has occupied key roles, including Chairman of the Pollution Control Board in 2010, Parliamentary Secretary (PWD), and Advisor to the Chief Minister of Arunachal Pradesh. Additionally, he served as Deputy Speaker, Cabinet Minister (Minister of Power), and Speaker of the State Assembly from July 2016 to May 2019.

Shri Tenzing Norbu Thongdok's political journey has taken him to numerous national and international platforms, where he represented India in conferences across the UK, Bangladesh, Germany, Switzerland, South Korea, and Japan. These conferences addressed a wide array of topics, ranging from parliamentary affairs to environmental conservation and infrastructure development.

Appointed as a Member of the North Eastern Council, Shillong, through a notification from the Government of India, Ministry of Development of North Eastern Region, dated 14th February 2024, Shri Thongdok officially assumed office on 4th March 2024. His tenure spans three years, subject to further orders.

Shri K. Moses Chalai Indian Administrative Service (IAS)



Shri K. Moses Chalai, an esteemed Indian Administrative Service (IAS) officer from the Manipur cadre of the 1990 batch, held the position of Secretary at the North Eastern Council (NEC) Secretariat in Shillong from November 5, 2019, until February 16, 2024. During his tenure, Shri Chalai led NEC through several notable events and initiatives. Among these were the organization of three NEC Plenary Sessions, two Destination North East events, and the AKAM celebrations across the North East, attended by dignitaries, including the Honorable President of India on the Valedictory day. Another milestone event orchestrated under his leadership was the extensive celebration of the NEC Golden Jubilee, commemorating 50 years of NEC's journey, which saw the participation of dignitaries, including the Honorable Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi.

Shri Chalai's tenure exemplified a steadfast commitment to innovation, collaboration, and long-term planning, leaving a lasting impact on the region's socio-economic landscape.

Under his stewardship, groundbreaking projects such as the 5G Application Initiative, Digital Designing in Animation, and Digital Tourism were implemented. Kharshiing, a distinguished officer from the Indian Audit & Accounts Service (IA&AS) cadre of 1991 hailing from Meghalaya, served as the Planning Advisor at the North Eastern Council (NEC). He played a key role in framing and approving the Backward Blocks Development Guidelines and the Standard Operating Procedures for supporting projects by non-government organizations.

Shri Kharshiing actively participated in the preparation for the 2023-24 fiscal year, including the allocation and prioritization of projects for various North Eastern states. He oversaw the creation of a project shelf for both state and central components, ensuring a systematic approach to project planning and implementation.



During his tenure at NEC, Shri Panmei's meticulous financial planning left an indelible mark on the council's operations, facilitating socio-economic development in the North East region. Notably, his detailed approach ensured comprehensive scrutiny and proper appraisal of medium-value projects ranging from ₹5 to ₹15 crore. Moreover, starting from the fiscal year 2021-22, he streamlined the approval process for small-value projects, meticulously reviewing 173 projects totaling ₹495.81 crore and 174 projects worth ₹433.53 crore.

As a key member of the Sectoral Empowered Committee (SEC), Shri Panmei's insights were instrumental in prioritizing projects exceeding ₹5 crore, as well as smaller projects up to ₹5 crore. He represented NEC in various State Level Empowered Committee (SLEC) meetings,



particularly during the 2019–20 period, where he conducted reviews of projects sanctioned by the Project Implementation Committee (PIC). Additionally, his active participation in Expenditure Finance Committee (EFC) meetings ensured the thorough preparation and submission of NEC's budgetary allocations, managing an outlay of ₹3500 crore under the 14th Finance Commission and ₹3843.24 crore for the 15th Finance Commission period.

He also spearheaded the successful implementation of the PFMS EAT module for online fund release, onboarding 350 implementing agencies and ensuring full implementation by FY 2017-18. Shri Panmei's efforts in recovering and depositing ₹90.72 crore of unspent balances and ₹20 crore of accrued interest to the Consolidated Fund of India (CFI) significantly bolstered financial accountability. Additionally, his proactive measures in revitalizing the Audit Wing and Audit Committee, coupled with the resolution of all outstanding audit issues, ensured the effective functioning of these critical oversight mechanisms.

On March 28, 2024, officers and staff organized a farewell ceremony for Shri G. Panmei at the NEC Secretariat Auditorium. Colleagues expressed their gratitude for his unwavering dedication and exemplary service to the NEC and the North Eastern Region.

NECSEWA: Enhancing Employee Welfare & Community Building

A Summary of Activities from August 1st, 2018, to April 30th, 2024

Established in 2004 with the objective of enhancing employee welfare and fostering a sense of community, NECSEWA (North Eastern Council Secretariat Employee Welfare Association) conducted various activities until 2006. Following a period of inactivity, the association was revitalized in 2018, with the new Executive Committee assuming responsibility on August 1st, 2018. This marked the beginning of a renewed commitment to supporting employees and strengthening intra-organizational bonds.

Welfare Initiatives:

During the reporting period, NECSEWA initiated several welfare programs:

- Farewell Gifts: Thirty (30) officials who retired, superannuated, or were repatriated during the period received farewell gifts valued at approximately ₹15,000 each.
- Ex-gratia Relief: Two members received ₹10,000.00 each, while one member (according to revised bye-laws) received ₹25,000.00 on the demise of their dependant family members.
- Medical Assistance: Financial aid of ₹10,000 each was provided to two members for medical expenses.
- Covid-19 Relief: NECSEWA contributed ₹3,00,000 to the Dorbar Shnong, Nongrim Hills, for a Covid Care Centre during the pandemic.
- NEC Gym & Badminton Courts: A fully equipped gym and two synthetic badminton courts were installed in the NEC Guesthouse, Nongrim Hills, Shillong. These facilities are maintained by the Association from revenue generated through monthly fees from outside members who have availed membership for badminton courts.

Farewell gifts, ex-gratia relief, and medical relief were funded from the monthly contributions of members. Separate contributions for farewell, ex-gratia, and medical relief were discontinued following the commencement of monthly subscriptions.

Cultural Events:

NECSEWA organized various cultural events:

- Pre-Christmas and New Year Celebrations: Held on December 19th, 2018, these events brought together employees and their families for festive cheer.
- Picnic: An outing at Mawphanlur on February 9th, 2019, provided an opportunity for relaxation and camaraderie.
- NEC Golden Jubilee: A grand in-house celebration on November 7th, 2022, marked by cultural activities and a Golden Jubilee Quiz Competition.
- NEC Golden Jubilee Invitation Football Tournament: Held from August 5th to 11th, 2023, with participation from nine (9) teams representing different Central Government offices in Shillong. Prizes were awarded to the winning teams.
- Walk at historic place: Conducted successfully on October 28th, 2023, with officials and staff visiting the Ing Sad of Hima Khyrim located at Smit town.
- Freedom Run 4.0: Successfully conducted on October 31st, 2023, with about 100 students from 5 schools participating.
- Pre-New Year Celebration: Themed 'One Day to Children' and celebrated on December 22nd, 2023, with aid materials distributed to 6 orphanages in Shillong.
- Swachh Bharat Program: Conducted two activities in support of cleanliness initiatives during October 2023.

Sports & Recreational Activities:

- Promoting physical fitness and recreational activities was a priority for NECSEWA:
- NEC Recreation Weeks: The association organized three such weeks, featuring various games and competitions.
- Trekking Event: Organized at Rhododendron Trek, Shillong, on October 27th, 2023, with enthusiastic participation from employees across age groups.

Recreational activities were suspended during 2021 & 2022 due to the Covid-19 pandemic and activities related to NEC Golden Jubilee Celebrations.

Through these initiatives, NECSEWA has not only enhanced employee welfare but also strengthened the sense of community within the organization, fostering a supportive and inclusive environment for all its members.
