Minister of State for Development of North East Region and Education, Dr. Sukanta Majumdar inaugurates the Centre for Brahmaputra Studies at Gauhati University

On September 20, 2024, Dr. Sukanta Majumdar, the Hon'ble Minister of State for Development of North Eastern Region (DoNER) and Education, inaugurated the Centre for Brahmaputra Studies at Gauhati University. - The Centre's primary mission is to provide insights and solutions that guide the sustainable development of the region and ensure the well-being of the people who rely on the Brahmaputra.

Some key objectives include:

- 1. Conducting multidisciplinary research on the river's flow networks and environmental dynamics.
- 2. Studying the relationship between the land, river, and the people who depend on it.
- 3. Establishing a comprehensive data repository that will become an invaluable resource for future research and policymaking.

4. Collaborating with national and international organizations to develop policies that address challenges like floods, erosion, and hydrological changes.

Capacity Building and Innovation

- The Centre will also focus on capacity building by organizing training programs, workshops, and short-term courses to equip students, researchers, and policymakers with the knowledge needed to tackle the challenges surrounding the Brahmaputra.
- In addition, the Centre will foster public awareness about the importance of the Brahmaputra and set up an innovation hub to develop solutions for key challenges like water management, energy, and environmental sustainability.

International Collaboration

- This Centre will include contributions from some of the most renowned international scholars, bringing in global best practices to find solutions for the North Eastern Region's unique challenges.
- This exchange of knowledge will place Gauhati University on the global map, enhancing its standing as a leading research institution.

Supported by the North Eastern Council (NEC) with a funding allocation of ₹28 crores, the Centre is poised to gain international recognition as a vital institution addressing the complex challenges posed by the Brahmaputra River.

The inauguration event was attended by prominent figures including Prof. Nani Gopal Mahanta, Vice Chancellor of Gauhati University, Shri Angshuman Dey, Joint Secretary of the Ministry of DoNER, and Ms. Sherry Lalthangzo, Economic Adviser at NEC, alongside faculty members, students, and other distinguished guests.

Dr. Hemanta Kumar Nath, Registrar of Gauhati University, set a positive tone with the welcome address.
